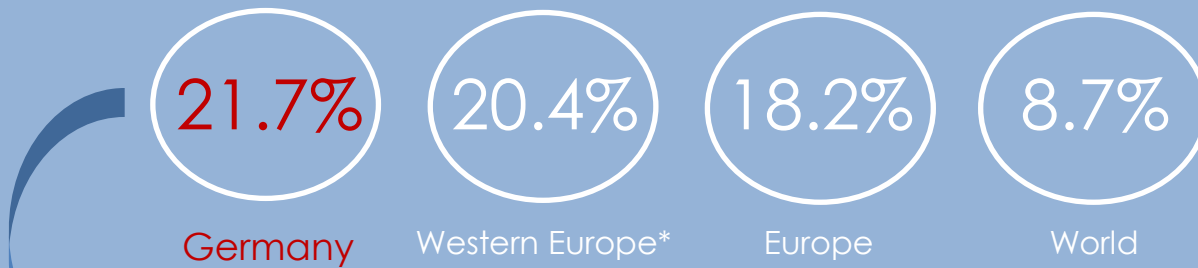


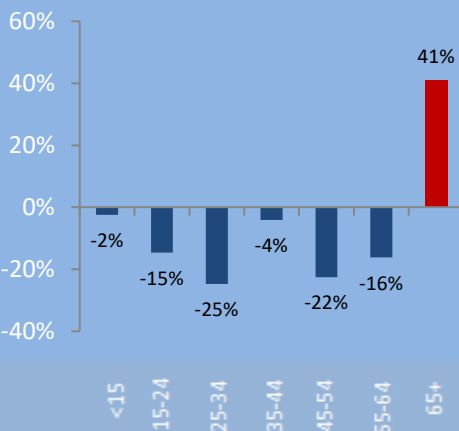
## Germany

Based on the percent of its population age 65+ in 2017, Germany ranks #4 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #1 out of 7 in Western Europe.

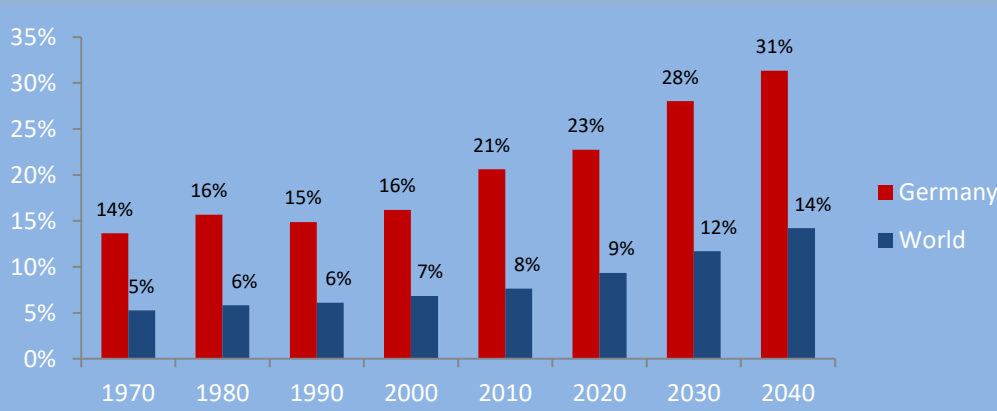


Change in Population by Age:  
2015-2035

In Germany, the age 65+ population will increase 41% between 2015 and 2035 (compared to an 89% increase globally during this period). Meanwhile its total population will shrink 3%. For comparison, Germany's age 65+ growth rate ranks #175 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #6 out of 7 in Western Europe.

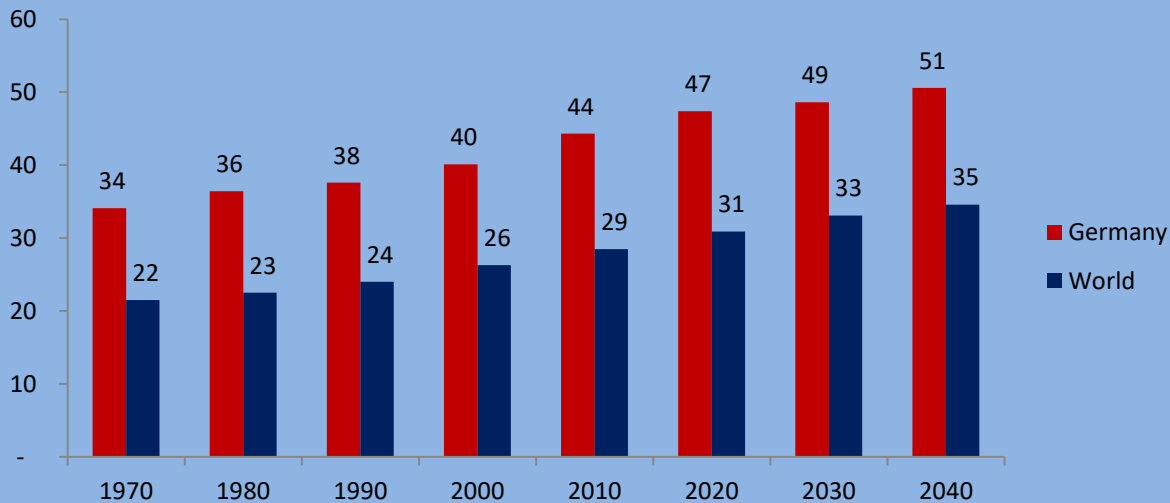
### What is a dependency ratio?

An "old age" dependency ratio is the number of people age 65+ per 100 "working age" people age 20-64. It is therefore intended to measure burden on the working population to provide pensions and support for retirees.

### How does Germany compare?

The old age dependency ratio in Germany is 34.9. This means there are 34.9 people age 65+ per 100 people age 20-64. Based on this ratio, Germany ranks #5 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #1 out of 7 in Western Europe, in terms of pressure on working populations to support retirees.

## Median Age: 1970-2040



In 2015, the median age in Germany was 46.2. The country ranks #2 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #1 out of 7 in Western Europe.

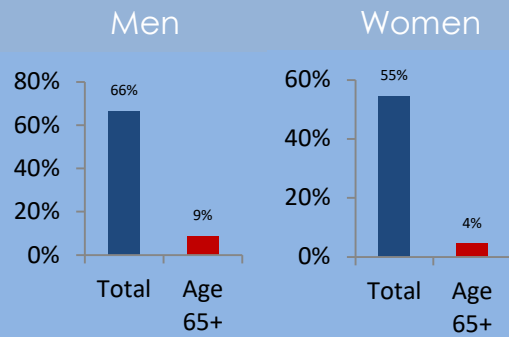

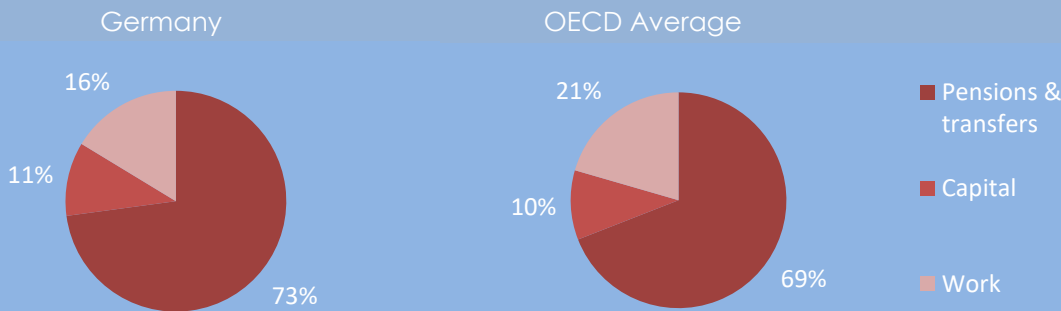
