


Percent of Population Age 65+, 2017



Based on the percent of its population age 65+ in 2017, Serbia ranks Southern Europe.




Change in Population by Age: 2015-2035

"Old Age" Dependency Ratio





What is a dependency ratio?

An "old age" dependency ratio is the number of people age 65+ per 100 "working age" people age 20-64. It is therefore intended to measure burden on the working population to provide pensions and support for retirees.

How does Serbia compare?

The old age dependency ratio in Serbia is 28.3. This means there are 28.3 people age 65+ per 100 people age 20-64. Based on this ratio, Serbia ranks #27 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #8 out of 12 in Southern Europe, in terms of pressure on working populations to support retirees.



Median Age: 1970-2040

In 2015, the median age in Serbia was 40.6. The country ranks #31 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #9 out of 12 in Southern Europe.

Life Expectancy (Age) At Age 65




Total life expectancy at birth among all men and women born in Serbia is projected to average 75.4 from 2015-2020, ranking #88 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #12 out of 12 in Southern Europe.

The combined labor force participation rate among men and women age 65+ in Serbia was 7.8% in 2015, ranking #146 out of the 180 nations and territories for which this is measured.
