






# Change in Population by Age: 2015-2035

In the U.S., the age 65+ population will increase 64% between 2015 and 2035 (compared to an 89% increase globally during this period). Meanwhile its total population will increase by just 12%. For comparison, the U.S.'s age 65+ growth rate ranks #153 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 in Northern America.



#### What is a dependency ratio?

An "old age" dependency ratio is the number of people age 65+
per 100 "working age" people age 20-64. It is therefore intended
to measure burden on the working population to provide

#### How does the U.S. compare?

The old age dependency ratio in the U.S. is 24.7. This means there are 24.7 people age 65+ per 100 people age 20-64. Based on this ratio, the U.S. ranks #37 out o 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 ir Northern America, in terms of pressure on working populations to support retirees.



In 2015, the median age in the U.S. was 38.0. The country ranks #48 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and




