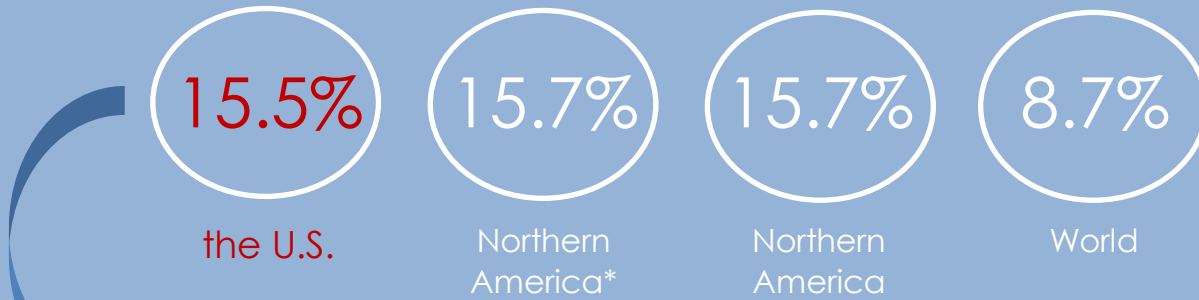




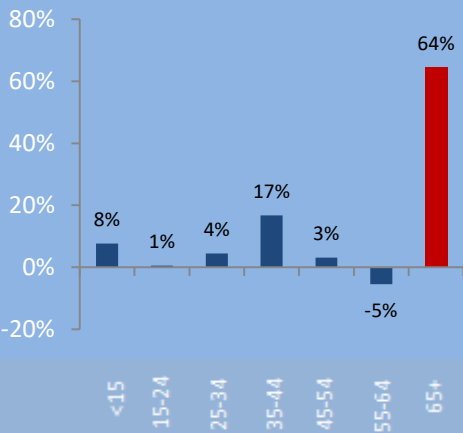

Based on the percent of its population age 65+ in 2017, the U.S. ranks #40 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 in Northern America.

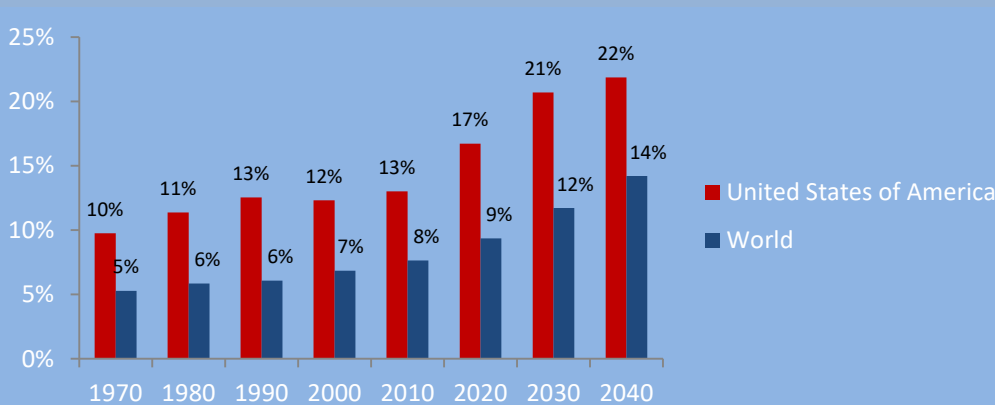


Change in Population by Age: 2015-2035

In the U.S., the age 65+ population will increase 64% between 2015 and 2035 (compared to an 89% increase globally during this period). Meanwhile its total population will increase by just 12%. For comparison, the U.S.'s age 65+ growth rate ranks #153 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 in Northern America.

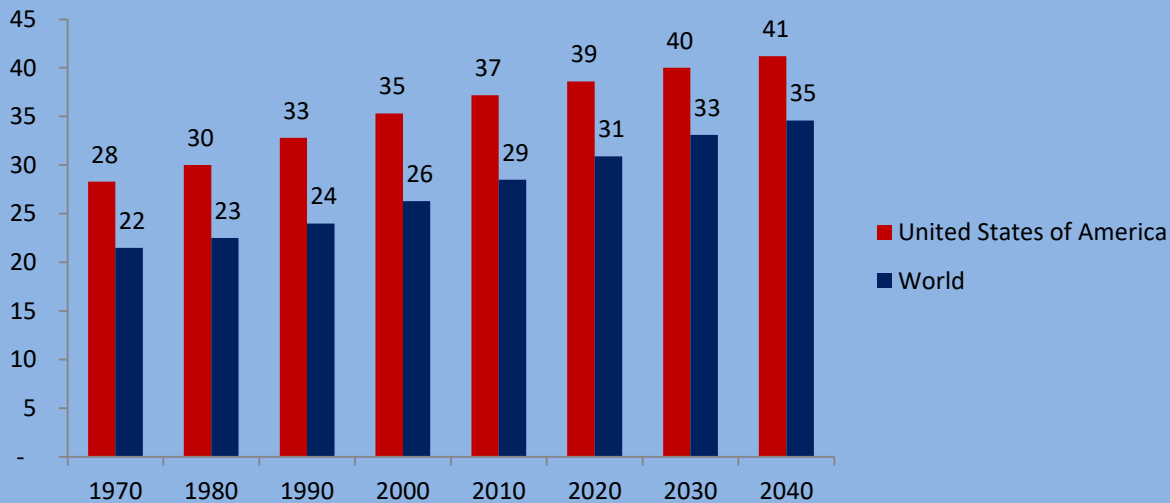
What is a dependency ratio?

An "old age" dependency ratio is the number of people age 65+ per 100 "working age" people age 20-64. It is therefore intended to measure burden on the working population to provide pensions and support for retirees.

How does the U.S. compare?

The old age dependency ratio in the U.S. is 24.7. This means there are 24.7 people age 65+ per 100 people age 20-64. Based on this ratio, the U.S. ranks #37 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 in Northern America, in terms of pressure on working populations to support retirees.

Median Age: 1970-2040



In 2015, the median age in the U.S. was 38.0. The country ranks #48 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #2 out of 2 in Northern America.

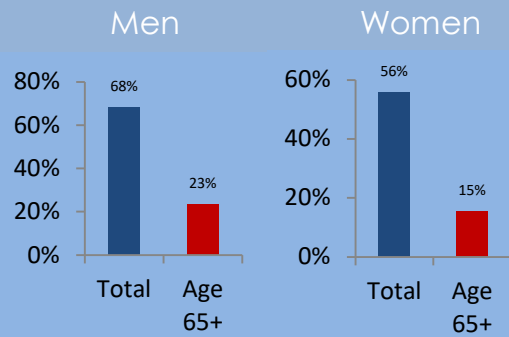

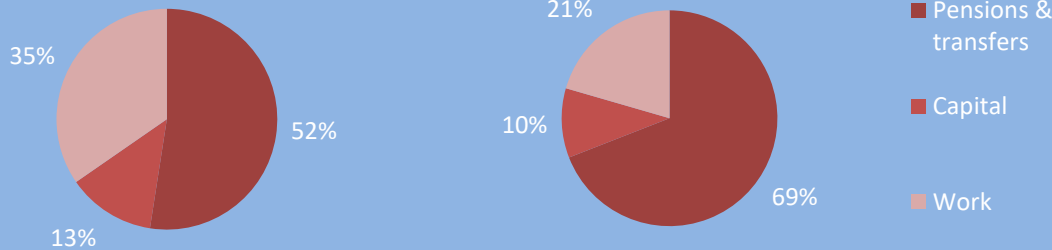
