




# Change in Population by Age: 2015-2035

In Cameroon, the age 65+ population will increase 78% between 2015 and 2035 (compared to an 89% increase globally during this period). Meanwhile its total population will increase by just 49%. For comparison, Cameroon's age 65+ growth rate ranks #131 out of 201 nations and territories in the world, and #7 out of 9 in Middle Africa.




